

This book shows orchids in their many varied forms and colors. From the common phalaenopsis to the rarest species, the authors uncover some of the most beautiful examples





The array and diversity of orchids he displayed led me to love the mini varieties, that and the lack of growing room indoors. Greg Allikas' OrchidWorks web site explained color flow and what judges are looking for.

Doing your first display is a learning experience. The tags were pre-done but they were blue so we yanked them out and replaced them with black tags with white ink, thanks to Teddie Jones. A 2" fan was used for air movement and we soaked the sheet moss that stayed wet for the humidity required. A spray mister was used daily also.

We did a pre set-up at home and brought a photo for color flow and to help us set up. Jeanne pulled two plants out because it was too cluttered. 
March JOS Show Exhibit

Growing Tips for April

This month is one of the busiest for every orchid grower. After a period of relative dormancy, orchids of every kind are beginning to

grow. New orchid growers must learn to recognize when the growth cycle begins. Proper repotting and fertilizing of orchids depends on that recognition. The purpose of repotting should not be to multiply a plant, but to replace decaying medium. A well grown plant, however, will often need a larger pot and yield extra pieces (divisions) for friends.

In nature, growth begins with some signal from nature, usually a change in day length or the beginning of the rainy season. Orchid hobbyists who become skilled growers of species also become



competent naturalists because they must learn the key elements of the environment from which their difficult-to-grow orchids come.



Most of us do not undertake growing the difficult species, but enjoy the more generic hybrids that are much easier to grow and for which, signs of growth are clear. Standard phalaenopsis, those with

large flowers, begin their growth cycle when days begin to get longer and the temperature within the pot remains above 60 F. They will begin growth even with flowers on spikes. However, growth will begin earlier and proceed faster if spikes are removed. New leaves emerging from the center of the old leaves and new roots breaking from the stem just above the last living roots are a sure sign that growth has begun.

When this happens, your phalaenopsis can be repotted with the least damage. If your phalaenopsis was a gift, it likely needs repotting. If the medium in the pot seems to stay wet longer or your orchid's leaves are wilting, it likely needs

repotting. Repotting can be as simple as removing the plant from the medium, shaking the old medium from the roots and replacing the orchid in a new pot with new medium. New hobbyists can find lots of information, including

videos, on the process of repotting or attend a local orchid society potting demonstration and learn how to repot a phalaenopsis. It is easy.



Cattleya hybrids can generally be repotted

in spring too. The trick is to begin the process before the orchid initiates root growth. Once new roots begin, there is the risk of damage to these new roots, which may set the plant back. It is OK to repot before roots are seen unless the hybrid is a 'bifoliate-type' (very tall pseudobulbs and two or more leaves on each bulb). If you have one

of this group, wait until you see new roots, which may be later in the spring or early summer. Members of this group can be killed by repotting at the wrong time.



Paphs and Phrags

(slippers) are best repotted right after they flower. While they decrease their growth rate when light levels are lower, they will grow all year long. Usually, there is a new growth beginning to mature as the older growth finishes flowering on a plant.

Vandas are particularly sensitive to low temperatures. This group of orchids grows best in high light, accompanied by night temperatures above 65°F and days above 80°F.

Most mature vandas are grown mounted or in baskets. Hobbyists that grow indoors are often enticed into purchasing vandas in hanging baskets and then left wondering what to do with them. They can be repotted into large clay pots as long as the



medium has a diameter of an inch or more. However, it is best to avoid repotting this type of orchid. Once it gets warm, find a place outside under a lightly shading tree and water frequently.






Pot. Elegant Dancer 'Rouge', Grown By Sue Bottom

Sue's Bottom's Cattleyas. I love cattleyas. I pot them in a very coarse, free draining mix and water them every 3 days or so in the summer and maybe once a week or every 10 days in the winter. The secret to cattleyas is getting enough light for them to have the energy to bloom without sunburning the leaves. Borrow the light meter and check out your growing area to find the best spot for them. Getting the light and the water right for cattleyas is 90% of the blooming solution. The potting mix of aliflor, tree fern, redwood bark, sponge rok and charcoal has encouraged incredible roots. If you want blooms you have to have a vibrant plant and you can't have a vibrant plant without a great root system. Then add a Cal-Mag fertilizer, some Innoculaid and the latest snake oil Messenger, wow!

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

Paul's Potinara Yaw Huan Glory 'GF': I got this plant last year from Fred Keefer of Orchids by Del-Rei and I mounted it on one of my St. Johns River cypress wood pieces. She took right off and was rooted onto it in less than four months. She bloomed for me for the first time ten months after her mounting. She's in the oleander orchid tree now (or will for two more weeks – we are moving to Prairie Creek!) People keep asking me if I am taking the oleander tree with me. No, it stays here on Joiner Street, but I will have a yard full of stately live oaks to choose from! My mounted plants get watered more frequently than the potted ones do – almost every day in warmer months. They get Inoculaid and Orchid Pro once a week. Small Cattleyas in particular, seem to do very well with mounted culture.

Orchid Questions & Answers


Q. I'm wondering if you can tell me what is causing this. The blackness is just on the surface of the leaves at the joints and there is what looks like sap beads on some of the leaves too. Otherwise the plant seems healthy; it has put out 2 new big fat roots, one on each side of the plant. You can see the green one on this side at the base. I have never see anything like this before. There are no white 'fuzzy' places, even down in the crevices, so I didn't think it was mealy bug. Can you help? What will cure it?

A. The reddish black coloration looks like normal pigmentation from good bright light. The liquid looks like honeydew, a thick syrupy sap that is sometimes exuded from inside the plant and can be harmless. It's possible that a sucking insect (scale, aphids, mealybugs) has pierced into the plant and drawn out its sap so look into the crevices closely for some critter. As a precaution, you can water blast the plant with a sprayer set on 'flat' to dislodge any hidden pests. Then do exactly what you were doing before because that plant looks very healthy.



Q. I am getting ready to repot and want to re-use some old pots. I usually soak them overnight in a bleach solution to kill any unwanted organisms. What can I use to get the white powdery stuff off the outside. I know this is salt accumulation on the pots my sister-in-law gave me.

A. As I repot, I drop the used pot in a plastic tub that is filled with a 10% bleach solution. When it gets filled up in a day or two, I pull the pots out one by one and use a scouring pad on the water saturated pot to scrub off any salt or algae accumulation on the outside or roots on the inside. After that, I wash out the tub and make a fresh 10% bleach solution, sometimes with some pool algicide mixed in (2 tsp/gal). I return all the pots to the tub and soak them for another couple of hours. This should kill any pathogens lurking in the pot.



Q. What is happening to the leaves on my Gongora, they were a beautiful green and now they are all splotchy.

A. That sure looks like sunburn. With the sun moving higher in the sky and becoming more intense, it looks like the plant started receiving more light than it was accustomed to. You can cut away the unsightly sunburn and move the plant to lower light, it will grow new leaves.
